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Welcome to **KANOU JINJYA** in Higashi-Uraga, very close to Tokyo, Yokohama and Yokosuka. **Kanou Jinjya** is a Japanese "**Shinto**" Shrine. (It is different from a Buddhist Temple.) Shintoism is the traditional religion of the Japanese people. Shinto means "way of the gods." A "Kami" (god) can be found throughout nature, as a mountain, a river, a very old tree, or even as an animal. **Amaterasu**, the sun-goddess, is the ancient ancestor of the Japanese Emperor and, today, Amaterasu can be seen as the red-circle on the Japanese flag.

Locally, each shrine is respected for its resident-god and many times for a famous historical event or special activity. **Kanou Jinjya** is the home of the mountain-god, **Myojin**. Mt. Myojin was also an important observation-point for the Shoguns of old Japan, to protect Tokyo Bay. The famous Japanese sea-captain, **Katsu Kaishu**, stayed and prayed, at **Kanou Jinjya**, before he sailed to San Francisco, California.

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Kanou Jinjya can be reached from Tokyo's Shinagawa Station or Yokosuka Station on the KEIHIN-KYUKO "local" train with the destination "URAGA." At Uraga, exit the station, you can 1. take a taxi for a 10 minute ride to the Higashi Kanou Shrine

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or, **2**. at the exit "**U**", turn left, walk 5 minutes, to the signal light, then, turn right (see map below, follow the dots) and then, a short ten minute walk to the Higashi Kanou Shrine.



The ministry at Kanou Shrine can be traced back to 1508. The current shrine building was re-built in 1929 after the Great Kanto Earthquake of 1923, that destroyed much of Tokyo and Yokohama. The annual "mikoshi" festival is held in September.

MT. MYOJIN

Behind the shrine is Mt. Myojin, which rises more than 150 ft. (50 meters). At the top, there is a commanding-view of Tokyo Bay. Viewers can see ships, from all-over the world, passing below. At the summit, is the shrine-home of the god, Myojin.

Also, there is a large memorial dedicated to the souls of those who died in maritme accidents or conflicts.

In 1858, a trade-treaty was signed between Japan and the United States. In 1859, the Shogun decided to send a ship, the Japanese **"Kanrin-Maru**" to San Francisco, in 1860, as an ocean-sailing training adventure.

KATSU KAISHU

A young samurai, named **Katsu Kaishu**, was chosen to be the captain of the ship. This adventure would be very dangerous. It was the first-time for a Japanese ship to sail across the vast Pacific Ocean.

Katsu Kaishu went to the Kanou Shrine, to pray for a safe journey. His prayers were answered. On February 10, 1860, Captain Katsu sailed from Uraga to San Francisco, and returned on June 23, 1860.

Today, the Kanou Shrine, offers a traveler's amulet, the "**Katsu-Omamori**" to visitors for a small donation. The amulet helps travelers feel more confident and secure about their journey.





ACANTHUS TEA CAFE ****

Next to Kanou Shrine is a café, called Acanthus. It is very unique because of its design. The café is a conservatory that was imported directly from England. The building is similar, in design, to the famous London KEW Royal Botanic Garden Conservatory and the Victorian-era Crystal Palace.

A visit to the café is like a visit to London for "afternoon tea."

ATAGO-MARU FERRY

From the Kanou Shrine, walk to the ferry-landing. If the ferry is not there,



press the call-button and the ferry will return from the other side of the bay. After the ferry-crossing, turn **<u>Right</u>**, to walk back to Uraga Station (train to Yokosuka, Yokohama & Tokyo).



COMMODORE PERRY PARK and MUSEUM

If you would like to visit Perry Park and museum in Kurihama, turn **Left**, and walk for 30 minutes. The walk is along flat-land, downhill and through a short tunnel. Also, at Kurihama, there are two stations with trains going to Tokyo & Yokohama.
